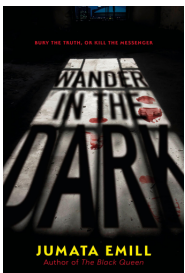
Albert, Melissa. *The Bad Ones*. Flatiron, 2024.

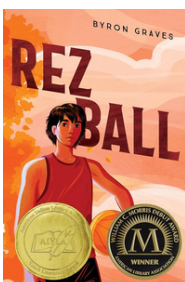
Emill, Jumata, *Wander in the Dark*. Ember, 2024. (Mature)

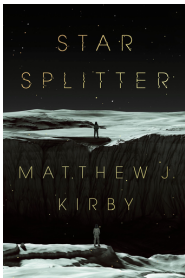

So one day he decides to "improve" the billboard. River is sure that Dylan would find it hilarious, but some classmates don't feel the same and River is blackmailed into joining a research study, the Affinity Trials, for teens who are "struggling socially". During the Trials, River has to face his grief, an ex-best friend (and Dylan's former girlfriend), and he meets an interesting jock from another school who begins to remind him of Dylan.
